"Prince or Pretender" James 1:26, 27 April 27, 2014

Here's what James means when he uses the word "religion". Religion is the <u>outward expression</u> of something that has happened internally.

Our text describes two types of religion:

- 1. Worthless religion
- 2. Pure religion

Worthless religion (v.26)

Is the man in verse 26 a prince or a pretender?

Verse 26 reveals that he is a <u>pretender.</u>

How do we know that?

Because verse 26 says, "he does not <u>bridle</u> his <u>tongue</u>

The word "bridle" speaks of <u>harnessing</u> an <u>animal</u>.

Our salvation includes:

- 1. Freedom from the penalty of sin.
- 2. Freedom from the <u>power</u> of sin.
- 3. Freedom from the <u>presence</u> of sin.

Pure religion v.27)

The word "pure" in verse 27 speaks of that which is <u>clean</u> and refers to our <u>motives</u>. The word "undefiled" means to be without stain.

Two ways pure religion is manifested to others:

Ministry to those in need (v.27)

"Orphans and widows" were the most <u>helpless</u> people in Jewish society during that time and their <u>affliction</u> was great. The word "visit" means to care for, to exercise oversight, to help.

A separated life (v.27)

The word "unstained" means to not be polluted.

Are you a prince or a pretender? Is your religion worthless or pure?
