"For Such A Time As This"

Esther 4:1-17 October 12, 2014

Can one person really make a difference in this world?

Point #1: Mordecai was totally broken. (v.1)

Sackcloth refers to garments made of <u>rough</u> cloth, usually from <u>camel's</u> hair or <u>goat's</u> hair and it was regarded as <u>unclean</u> because it was worn when grieving the dead. (v.2)

Point #2: The Jews were desperate for God. (v.3)

Point #3: Suffering has a tendency to bring people together. (v.3)

Point #4: Esther was insulated as queen. (v.4)

Point #5: Mordecai wasn't looking for the queen's apparel he was looking for the queen's attention. (v4)

Point #6: Mordecai didn't fabricate the story and he didn't exaggerate the facts. (v.5-8)

Important truth: There is no such thing as positive gossip. (v.5-8)

Questions to think about before you share something:

I. Is it true?

- 2. Will it tear someone down or build someone up?
- 3. Does it glorify Jesus or does it grieve the Holy Spirit?

Two things I want you to notice in verse 8:

Mordecai just told Hathach that Esther was a Jew.

Mordecai was challenging Esther through Hathach to appeal to the king on behalf of the Jewish people.

Question: What did Hathach do with the information? He returns and tells Esther everything.

Point #7: You don't just waltz into the king's throne room uninvited. (v.10-12)

Mordecai says three things to Esther in verses 13 & 14:

- 1. If you do nothing, don't think you will escape death because you're living in the palace.
- 2. God will use someone to save our nation.
- 3. Maybe it's you, Esther.
