## "Leaving A Legacy"

Esther 2:19-23 September 21, 2014

Definition of legacy: A legacy is the <u>story</u> of someone's life—the <u>things</u> they did, <u>places</u> they went, <u>goals</u> they accomplished, their failures, and more.

Legacy is something that a person leaves behind to be remembered by.

"Everyone leaves behind a legacy after they die, but only a few people leave behind a legacy worth talking about." - Anonymous

Question: Who made this statement—"Let's roll!" - just minutes before his death?

Answer: Todd Beamer

Question: What were the names of the two men who wanted to assassinate King Ahaseurus?

Answer: Bigthan and Teresh

Question: Where was the hand of God in verses 21 & 22?

Answer: Mordecai just so happens to be the right man at the right place at the right time and he

has uncovered this assassination plot.

Question: What does Mordecai do when he uncovers the assassination plot?

Answer: He tells <u>Esther</u> who in turn tells the king. Question: What happened to Bigthan and Teresh?

Answer: They were <u>hanged</u> on the <u>gallows</u> The phrase "hanged on the gallows" is probably better understood that they were <u>impaled</u> at the <u>stake</u>.

What does Mordecai receive for saving the king's life? (two key pieces of information that determine Mordecai's legacy)

- 1. "...and Esther told the king in the name of Mordecai. (v.22)
- 2. "And it was <u>recorded</u> in the book of the <u>chronicles</u>. the presence of the king." (v.23b)
