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## Religion or Relationship

Romans 2:17-29 October 1 2017

"It is possible to be a Christian without being religious."

"It is possible to be religious without being a Christian."

(Fritz Ridenour)

## Advantages the Jews held over the Gentiles:

1. The  $1^{st}$  advantage of the Jew is their name. (v.17a)

The name "Jew" means praise to "Yahweh".

Note: When people are steeped in religion they talk about their names and churches.

When people are steeped in Christianity they talk about Jesus.

2. The 2<sup>nd</sup> advantage of the Jew is their book. (v. 17b-18)

"...rely upon the <u>Law</u> and boast in God, and know His will and approve the things that are essential, being instructed in the Law." (v. 17a-18)

3. The 3<sup>rd</sup> advantage of the Jew is their works. (v. 19, 20)

## Two devastating blows to the Jew:

1. Preaching without practice. (v. 21-24)

Note the 5 questions Paul asks:

#1: "You, therefore who teach another do you teach yourself." (v.21)

#2: "You who preach that one shall not steal do you steal? (v.21)

#3: "You say that one should not commit adultery, do you commit adultery?" (v.22a)

#4: You abhor idols do you rob temples?" (v 22b)

#5: "You boast in the Law, through your breaking the Law, do you dishonor God?" (v.23)

Question: What's the point of the questions?

Answer: The point is that <u>religious people</u> are good at telling other people <u>what to do</u>. Unfortunately, they often do the very thing they condemn in others.

Question: What do you call people who say one thing and do another?

Answer: Hypocrites

2. Ritual with reality (v.25-27)

Two points to answer the Jews' wrong understanding of circumcision:

- 1. Circumcision is of value if you practice the Law.
- 2. It is better to be <u>uncircumcised</u> and truly <u>obey God</u> than to be <u>circumcised</u> and <u>break</u> God's Law.

Why is Paul's teaching relevant? Paul is saying that <u>religious ritual</u> is <u>worthless</u> unless something has <u>already happened</u> in the heart.

In Romans 2:28, 29 Paul explains the matter of what makes a person acceptable to God both negatively and positively:

- 1. Negative: Being acceptable to God is not an outward thing.
- 2. Positive: Being acceptable to God is an inward thing.
